Learning Outside the Classroom

Creating animal homes.

As part of our Percy the Park Keeper mantle, Hedgehog class had the challenge of rehoming some animals. Thanks to the great storm that tore through the park, the children found themselves with some injured hedgehogs, squirrels, rabbits and foxes to care for. Once they had recovered, the animals needed rehoming. The children learnt about the different homes the animals lived in and went out onto the field to create them some new homes. Can you spot the animals in their warrens, dreys, nests and dens?



Y2/3/4 LOtC sessions

This term the children have been studying what plants need to survive. This took our learning outside to look at healthy plants. Squirrels identified the fact that the soil was moist and contained nutrients. They also considered how a plants exposure to sunlight and the impact of the temperature of their environment were important. To understand how plants absorbed water from the soil, Squirrels simulated how plants absorb water from the ground by experimenting outside using a bowl of water, sponges (roots), syringes (stem), and towelling material (leaves).

Mantle of the Expert

Percy's Park Keepers finish their work.

After several weeks of helping Percy the Park Keepers, the Hedgehog team's work is done. They have done an excellent job of learning about and caring for the mammals, birds and amphibians of the park and recently managed to catch a gruffalo that was roaming free. It took a lot of planning to do this: making traps, laying them in the park with mice to tempt the gruffalo, and waiting patiently for their plan to work. However, eventually the gruffalo was caught and the park keepers had to decide what to do with it. They voted to allow it to stay in the park, on the condition that it would stop eating all the mice. They made it a cosy cave to live in. Our final episode saw the children becoming visitors to the park, using their cameras to take photos of the animals and therefore to create lots of memories of Percy's Park.

The Ancient Oak Tree.

In Squirrel Class this half-term the children became a team of Arboriculturists. They are passionate about an ancient oak tree and the animals that shared their habitats with it. Unfortunately, there was a terrible storm which affected the tree and its inhabitants greatly. Sadly, following the storm, the Mayor of the village declared the tree as a health and safety concern and has insisted the tree be cut down. The villagers (Squirrel class) were outraged by this and are doing everything in their powers to prevent it. Thanks to the research, care and consideration of the arboriculturists the tree may be saved and the animals may survive. There are particular concerns for Scaredy Squirrel who is currently stuck at the top of an unsafe tree with no food. Thankfully the Squirrels managed to design a pulley system, to hoist fresh acorns up to Scaredy Squirrel. The story will continue in November.

Roman Legionaries.

We finished ensuring the Roman Legion and Celts were reconciled and then Badger class have been working hard on preparing for their first Readings and Christingle service. This has been achieved by practicing their spoken parts, playing an accompaniment to Silent Night and thinking about stage directions and how to move on a stage! A lot of time was spent designing, creating, decorating and evaluating prototype Advent statues for the stable scene, sadly they didn't make it to the finished production. We are looking forward to a new Mantle in January where we will need our science heads on!

First Aid Workshop
