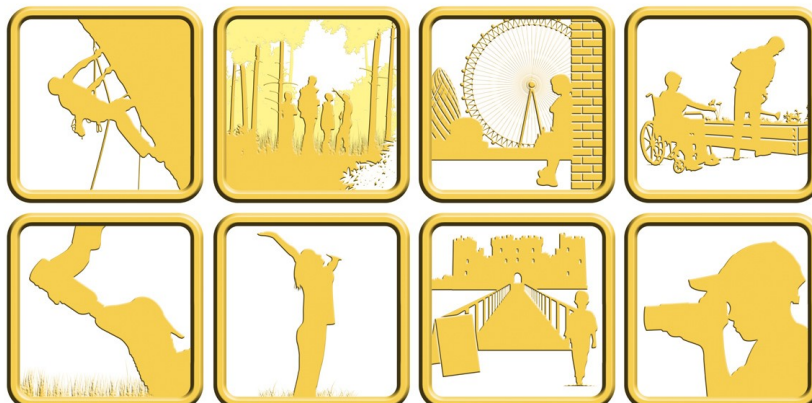

Class 1 Visit to Campbell Park

This half term, Class 1 has become the S.S.S.C. (Scientists who Study Strange Creatures). One blustery Thursday they visited Campbell Park, to assess its suitability as a habitat for some Gruffalos.



The children studied the plants and trees in the park, considered whether there would be enough food for the Gruffalos (they are omnivores, so the children suggested duck and magpie), climbed up a hill to look at the geographical features in the park and finally considered what other information might be useful. The good points of the park were: it has plenty of food for an omnivore and it has some shelter in the form of trees. However, the children decided that: it was also quite busy and noisy, the bikes and cars could be dangerous and the Gruffalos might disturb the forest school sessions as well as the cricket club.

The Great Fire of Buckingham

Visit from Ed Grimsdale, Buckingham historian

On Wednesday 16th May 2018 class two had a visitor called Ed Grimsdale. He came to tell us about the great fire of Buckingham. Ed Grimsdale started by telling us about the old jail and told us a story of why they built it and why people went there. We have been learning about the Great Fire of London which is why Ed came in to talk about the Great Fire of Buckingham. We learnt a lot. No one died in the Great Fire of Buckingham apart from 3 pigs and 1 horse. Fascinatingly, everyone owned a pig to eat in 1724 so they could have a slice of bacon everyday for a whole winter. Children started the fire because they were playing with flint and straw behind the Unicorn Inn, which is now an Oxfam Shop. The fire brigade was in Windsor and was pulled by a horse, so it took a whole day to get there. The fire lasted for 3 days. Luckily there was a bucket brigade. It's where people keep passing buckets to each other (see photos below!).

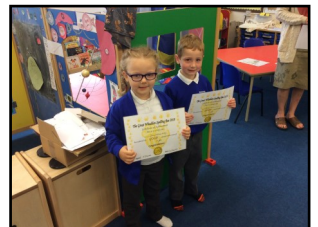


Spelling Bee

Forest School News

At last the sun hats and sun cream have made an appearance at Forest School! After months of learning how to keep warm, now the children are learning how to look after themselves in the sun. The change in temperature has meant that Base Camp has moved to the shade, which has proven popular.

The warmer weather has brought many other changes at Forest School. The children have noticed so many different plants growing it's hard to keep up. The living willow has needed watering, as well as the other plants we have planted; there have been plenty of opportunities to discuss what plants need to survive. Added to this are all of the insects that are coming out of hiding in the warmer weather.

Since the removal of the sheep next door, we have some very curious neighbours - a herd of friendly cows. They like to come over to see what we are doing. Their presence



has prompted discussions about what they eat, where milk comes from and what 'herbivores' are.

The final change is the arrival of a wormery, hand-built by Miss Swain. The children enjoyed stocking it up with soil, plant seeds, lavender and of course.... worms! It will be a great way to watch worms at work.

The 'Learning Outside the Classroom' assessor was very impressed with Forest School and enjoyed meeting the children there last week as they climbed trees and balanced along logs.


